Hytrin relaxes the muscles around the prestate and often produces the desired offects of reducing the urinary symptoms. New, another sister drug to hytrin which is chemically simi-lar and is said to produce the same effects as hytrin, is begin-ning to gain acceptance. It has the generic name docasosin mesylate. The latter is about 25 percent less costly than hytrin. The official medical protocol for treating BPE and BPH is watchful waiting." This means taking any medicine the doctors preseribe and going back for reg-ular checkups. For those who may read this and are already on hytrin, you may try asking your doctor about dozazosin mesylate.
