# Court ends Thompson's legal challenges

The Michigan Supreme Court split along gender lines in free-ing Teressa L. Nix from a first-degree murder charge in a gris-by Ponting case. degree murder ly Pontinc case.

ly Pontiac case.

The high court's 4-3 ruling came Dec. 30, a day before Oakland Prosecutor Richard Thompson left office, and it took a slap at Thompson.

Thompson, who appealed more cases than any of Michigan's 83 county prosecutors, wanted to try Nix as an accomplice in the ear trunk murder of Pamela Band.

Oakland Circuit Judge Fred Mester issued a directed verdiet at the end of her 1991 jury trial, freeing Nix of the murder charge. But Thompson sought a

second trial, arguing that Nix knew Bandy was in the trunk and owed her a legal duty to attempt to free her. Bandy died of dehydration and methanol poisoning from drinking wind-shield washer fluid.

The four male justices agreed another trial of Nix would amount to 'double jeopardy,' ascend trial for the same crime, prohibited by the U.S. Constitution.

Justice Michael Cavanagh said Thompson was attempting 'revisionist history of the principles underlying the double jeopardy clause. "Aliter considering all that evidence, the trial court (Judge Mester) ruled that it was legally insufficient to support a conviction of the charges brought against defendant.

This ruling by the trial court is completely dispositive (ends proceedings) of this case for purposes of the double jeopardy clause, asid Cavanagh. He was joined by Chief Justice James Brickley, outgoing Justice Charles Lewin and Justice Cranes Mallett Jr.

"The trial court's July 19, 1991, order was a binding legal resolution..." Cavanagh wrote. The fact of this ruling precludes appellate inquiry into its legal correctness."

Dissenting were Justices Patricia Boyle, Elizabeth Weaver and Dorothy Comstock Riley, It was a familiar pattern on the Michigan high court where the women justices have, tended to support prosecutors.

"I. . . would hold that defen-dant's retrial and conviction

was not barred by the double jeopardy clause of the fifth amendment of the United States Constitution," said

Boyle found a distinction
between "dismissals based on
determinations of facts and dismissals based on legal conclu-

sions."

Cavanagh's reply indicated the case had been hotly debated in the high court's inner sanctum. He accused Boyle of "strained reasoning" and said her dissent "obfuscates" the clear standard for determining double icapardy. double jeopardy.

Nix's boyfriend, Robert Hogans, has been in prison since mid-1991 for first-degree murder, kidnapping, raping, stripping and confining Bandy in the trunk of a car and driving

five or six days through the streets until Bandy died.
Aftor a Court of Appeals reversed Mester, another jury in mid-1992 convicted Nix of involuntary manslaughter, and she began serving a 7-15 years sentence. She appealed.

A second Court of Appeals panel reversed her conviction. Prosecutor Thompson appealed, and the case was argued Oct. 8. Thompson lost his August Republican primary bid for a hird term.

As of Jan. 1, women will have a 4-3 majority on the Supreme Court as former appellate Judge Marilyn Kelly of Bloomfield Hills joins the bench. She replaces Levin, who could not run again because he has reached age 70.
