BIDS WANTED
For a Concrete Arch Bridge, to be built east of Ervin Bros., near the town line in the township of Farmington.

The bridge to have a 14 foot span, seven feet in height, with 16 foot wide wings, north eight feet, south six feet. Foundation to be three feet thick and extend to solid foundation or not less than two feet below bed of stream. The Arch to be three feet at the base and ten inches at the top and to have a balustrade of eight inches to hold the gravel and two gas pipe rails with four posts, the wings to be two feet at the base and battered to one foot at the top and deep enough to be below the frost.

The bridge to be reinforced with 3-4 inch corrugated steel bars, not more than one foot apart lengthwise and crosswise wings to be tied to the abutments with corrugated bars every foot in height. The concrete to be composed of the best portland cement and clean, sharp gravel in the proportion of four to one in the arch and five to one in the abutments and guaranteed to carry fifteen tons in weight.

Bids will be received Aug. 1st, 1911 at 9 a. m. at the town hall, Farmington. The board reserves the right to reject any or all bids.
