

# Falcons' Thomas breaks school diving record

Senior Jeff Thomas broke the Farmington High School record in diving Thursday during a dual meet at Gresse Pointe North.

The Norsemen won the meet, 107-79, but the first-place finish by Thomas was one of the highlighte for the Falcons.

Thomas achieved a score of 286.60 points, which was 81 more than the old record that had stood for 15 years.

It was just a great performance, probably the best diving performance I've seen in years, Parmington coach Ross Bandy said.

"He was very steady and very peised. He was finishing his dives better than I've ever seen him do. There weren't any gimmes, either. He dove

well, and the judges were tough. He carned it all the way.
