Meadow Brook's 'Arcadia' amuses and intrigues

"It's wanting to know that makes us matter," states one of the characters noar the end of Tom Stoppard's 'Arcadia, 'a play of ideas that is both amusing and intriguing. Under the surc-handed direction of Geoffrey Sherman, the current production at Meadow Brook Theater fea-tures a strong cast with a sophis-ticated fair. Set in the dining room at Sidley Park, an English country estato, the play distrates scenes between 1809 and the present.

The modern characters try to impose their own theories on the Park's history, resulting in some amusing misconceptions about the original events the audience has just vitmessed. In both time periods charac-ters are seeking anavors. In 1609 Thomasina Covorly (Dana 1609 Thomasina La guest of the estate owners, is a 13 year old turor Soptimus Hodge (Raul mathematical truths. as her Thomasina humorously reveal as much curiosity about ser as about mathematics. As Hodge, the dashing tutor whom women sceme to find irre-sittible, Exparza is ausore and believable. Hodge is enamored of cetate owner Lady Croom (Diane Van Fossen), who is herself namored of Lord Byron, Hodge's visiting friend. Meanwhile, Thomasina is increasingly attracted to Hodge, as is the wife of Erar Chater (John Schort), another estate guest. Chadwick's portrayal of the marcow-sighted Nightingale is genorally funny as he jumps about in glee, hangs his head against the wall in frustration, and genorally mugs and gri-maces through his emotional ups and downs.
