

Raiders pummel Rockets in mercy romp

The combination of good pitching and timely hitting carried North Farmington to its third straight baseball victory Monday.

Junior left-hander Kirk Taylor tossed a five-hitter as the host Raiders defeated Westland John Glenn in a five-inning, mercy-rule game, 11-1.

Taylor (3-1) notched eight strikeouts, he hit one batter but didn't walk anybody.

"Kirk had excellent control, and he just gave up some base hits," North coach Irv Horowitz said. "He pitched his way out of some jams by striking some batters out."

"We're starting to hit the ball, too. If we continue to do that, with our pitching, we'll be in good shape."

BASEBALL

The Raiders had 10 hits — seven off Glenn starter Paul Merandi, who lasted three innings and took the loss.

Jeff Trzos, Tom Ouellette and Dave Gosselin had two hits each for North. Ouellette had three RBI, Trzos and Gosselin two each.

Ouellette and Trzos hit two-run doubles. Garry Penta, Jeff Seaman and Mike Gleason contributed RBI singles.

Gosselin and Trzos also scored some batters out.

Glenn had two hits from Gordie Smith and an RBI single from Tim Reeves.

North improved to 3-1 in the Lakes Division of the Western

Lakes Activities Association and 6-4 overall.

The school administration is investigating whether or not the Raiders used an academically ineligible player in several early-season games.

It's possible the Raiders might have to forfeit their first three victories if the player in question was ineligible at the time.

Glenn is 3-2 in the Lakes and 9-5 overall.

FARMINGTON 6, SOUTH LYON 5: Senior Paul Mitchell was the winning pitcher and hitting hero as the host Falcons avoided a second losing streak in as many days Tuesday.

Farmington (9-3) scored the winning run in the bottom of the seventh after hitting two in the top half to tie, 5-5.

With two outs, Jared Fitzpatrick doubled and scored the winning run on

Mitchell's single.

Mitchell was 4-for-4 with two RBI. He earned the victory in relief of starting pitcher Jason Temerowski, who left after four innings with a 3-2 lead.

Fitzpatrick had a pair of RBI, David Viane and Chad Fernandez one apiece.

STEVENSON 4, FARMINGTON 3: The host Spartans stole a victory from the Falcons in the late innings Monday.

It was Stevenson's first Lakes Division victory in five games. Farmington was 3-2 in the Lakes and 8-3 overall prior to playing again Tuesday.

The Spartans pulled to tie the score with three runs in the bottom of the seventh, and they scored the winning run on hitting later.

Winning pitcher Mike Allison started the eighth inning by drawing a walk. Roy Rabe then laid down a bunt and reached base safely on an error.

Justin Rier followed with a bunt single, and Mark Dietrich became the two with a one-out suicide squeeze bunt on the first pitch.

Dietrich went 3-for-4 with three RBI, including a two-run double in the seventh. Tony Dettillo's RBI single brought home Dietrich to send the game into extra innings.

Dave Viane, who pitched the final 13 innings in relief of starter Charlie Avery, took the loss for Farmington.

Pat Hickey had two of Farmington's five hits.

Allison, a senior left-hander, allowed just two walks while fanning two in picking up the win.

On Saturday, the Falcons won their first two games in the Chelsea Invitational. The tournament continues Saturday.

B.J. Muller hit a two-run homer in the first game, a 7-4 win over Milan. Jason Temerowski was the winning pitcher, and Paul Mitchell earned a save.

Mark Pruthomew went 4-for-8 in the two games as Farmington edged Ann Arbor Gabriel Richard in the next game, 6-5. Mitchell earned the pitching win.

REDFORD CC 15-8, NOTRE DAME 9-

7: Winning pitcher Anthony Toney doubled three times and knocked in seven runs in the opener Sunday as host Redford Catholic Central split a doubleheader with Harper Woods Notre Dame.

Toney pitched four innings before giving way to Ryan Ossenmacher.

Chris Woodruff added two doubles and an RBI, while Josh DeCarvo contributed two hits and two RBI.

Notre Dame came back to win the second game as Matt Stocelovich scattered nine hits over seven innings. He struck out 10 and walked three.

CC starter Mike Haller, who worked the first five before giving way to Matt Kazazek, took the loss.

The Shamrocks (7-8) had the bases loaded with two out in the seventh but couldn't tie it.

Toney and Dave Lusky had two hits each for CC. Lusky had three RBI, including a two-run single in the seventh.

The split left CC at 3-6 in the Central Division and Notre Dame 5-4.

Spartans deal Falcons first Lakes Division setback

Livonia Stevenson upset Farmington in girls softball Monday, giving the host Falcons their first Lakes Division loss in five games.

The Falcons were minus senior pitcher Alana Heikkinen, who injured a knee Friday at Walled Lake Central.

The Spartans overcame a 2-0 Farmington lead with two runs in each of the third, fourth and fifth innings.

Farmington was further frustrated by the fact it loaded the bases with nobody out in the last three innings and failed to score any more runs.

Freshman Melissa Mytty replaced Heikkinen, struck out 11 and walked seven. Both teams had five hits.

"Leanne Schraufnagle was the winning pitcher. She had three strikeouts, but the Falcons were unable to capitalize on 12 walks."

"We couldn't get a hit; we couldn't catch a break," Farmington coach Jerry Osborne said.

We made a couple mistakes behind Melissa, but we didn't play Farmington softball — the way we're capable of playing.

"It's very disappointing. We let Walled Lake Central back into (the division race); they're tied with us now."

"(The Spartans) were the better team today. Stevenson's better played through it. They stayed in the game and made all the

Kristi Copi had two hits and two RBI for Stevenson. Teri Fox and Stephanie Ladd added one RBI apiece.

The Spartans are 2-3 in the Lakes and 4-6 overall.

"We hit instead of bunting," Lusk said. "It was my fault; I lost the game." The big hit for the Marlins was a two-

run homer in the sixth by Erin Fitzgerald. Sarah Kinney, who had singled earlier, scored from first.

Mercy took the lead in the fourth inning when Dana Falvo scored on a groundout by Beth Ann Nowak.

Dana Dolekan improved her record to 7-1, striking out five and sealing on Jessica Roman and Sara Thiesmeyer had three hits apiece for the Blazers.

Melanie Grewe added a pair of hits. Cathy Hermann suffered the defeat despite fanning five and walking two.

Ladywood earned the split in the eighth as Hermann scattered four hits while striking out eight and walking three.

Trailing 1-0 entering the sixth, the Blazers erupted for three runs — two coming on a double down the right field line by Grewe.

Roman and Thiesmeyer had two hits apiece in the ninth hit attack.

Leah Mueller took the loss, though she struck out 11 and walked one.

The Marlins took a 10-0 lead in the third inning when Kelly Moug singled in Teri Schroeder.

"Our bats haven't been working well the last four games," Mercy coach Jack Falvo said. "I'm not sure if it's because of the great pitching we've been facing or if it's because we're in a slump."

"The defense was great, but it couldn't carry us in the second game."

Ladywood improved to 10-7 overall and 2-6 in the Catholic League Central Division. Mercy is 13-3 and 6-2.

HARRISON 5, W.L. WESTERN 4: The Hawks scored the winning run in the bottom of the 12th inning Monday at home.

The winning rally started with a single by Becky Vostler, who moved up when Al Autt was hit by a pitch and scored on

a single by Jamie Schwartz.

Western scored a run in the seventh to tie, 3-3. Both teams scored a run in the 10th inning. Schwartz also drove in that run with a single after Autt had doubled with two outs.

"That showed the true grit of the girls," Harrison coach Mike Frachman said of the two-out rallies. "It's a lot easier coming to bat if the girl before you got on base."

"Al Autt is doing a great job of pitching, too, especially in the later innings."

She's really working on her control now."

All Autt struck out eight and walked three while scattering seven hits. She retired the Warriors in the top of the 12th with just four pitches and three groundouts.

Kelly Derocher also had two of Harrison's eight hits. Angie Balconi was the losing pitcher.

The win improved the Hawks to 3-2 in the Western Division and 8-5 overall. The Warriors dropped to 4-4 and 3-9.

N. FARMINGTON 4-3, GLENN 2: The Raiders pounded 15 hits and used seven walks to move host Westland John Glenn in five innings Monday.

One of Kristin Timmer's two hits was a grand slam.

Kellie Fournier went 3-for-4 with two RBI; Katie Devereux and Mickey Splatz

were 2-for-3 with one RBI. Lynn Livernols had two RBI with a double and a bases-loaded walk.

Katie Collins was the winning pitcher and Katie Foran the loser. The Rockets made six errors.

North is 2-3 in the Lakes Division and was 5-9 overall following the win.

Samantha Grewe had two hits, including a solo homer, for Glenn, 1-4 and 4-11.

On the weekend, the Raiders lost their first four games in the Oronville-Brandon Tournament before finishing with a 9-3 win over L'Anse Creuse North on Sunday.

Livernols was 3-for-4 with two RBI. Jenny Pansh, winning pitcher Splatz and Diana Quigley batted in one run each.

Ann Arbor Gabriel Richard pounded out 47 hits off Michelle Ufford. The Trojans are 5-6 overall.

On Saturday, Clarencville finished with a 2-2 record in the Dominican Tournament at Round Rock.

Riedel had a 329 average while Sundberg had four extra-base hits.

FRANKLIN 18, CHURCHILL 4: The Patriots ran their record to 12-3 overall and 5-0 in the Western Division.

Franklin recorded a season-high 20 hits in the win over the defending Western champions, 5-7 and 3-4.

A seven-run Franklin first inning all but erased Churchill's hopes of winning. Randi Wolfe had two of the seven hits as Franklin sent 11 batters to the plate.

She went 4-for-4 before exiting the game in the sixth with a bruised knee after a collision at first base with Churchill runner Kristin Denwick.

Four other Patriots went 3-for-5: Andrea Kmet, Margaret Schultz, Missy Blanton and winning pitcher Lori Jendruski.

Jendruski upped her record to 12-2. The junior right-hander was not razor-sharp as in previous outings, but was good enough as she struck out four, walked four and scattered seven hits.

"Once we got down 5-1, instead of betting back, we kinda went through the motions."

Cornwell, who gave up five hits and one walk over 3 2/3 innings, pitched well until Western scored three more times in the fifth.

But Toner's RBI groundout in the third made it 7-1. Waselowsky had another RBI single in the fifth, and Crane smacked a two-run single.

The Warriors ended the game with three hits and a hit-by-pitch off reliever Mike Head in the sixth.

Crane limited the Hawks to four hits and three walks. He had just two strikeouts but let the defense, which turned two double plays, do its part.

"He knew the umpire wouldn't be calling the corners, so we talked about that," Conner said, adding Crane was prepared mentally to pitch a good game.

"Sometimes it's a frame of mind. I told him we have to adjust. I told him good ball teams adjust to the umpires. And our pitchers have confidence in our defense. He pitched a real nice game."

Herrington added he was disappointed Harrison didn't compete better in a game for first place, but the Hawks didn't have time to dwell on it.

"We have five more games this week; we have to move on," he said. "But Western will be tough to beat down the stretch."

ORDINANCE SUMMARY

C-638-97

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 3 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES, CITY OF FARMINGTON, MICHIGAN, BY AMENDING ARTICLE 1, SECTIONS 3-1, 3-2 AND 3-3, AND BY ADDING SECTIONS 3-7 AND 3-8, TO PROVIDE DEFINITIONS OF TERMS AND PHRASES, TO AMEND AND PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR OFFENSES CONCERNING MINORS IN BARS, SELLING OR FURNISHING ALCOHOLIC LIQUORS TO MINORS, PROVIDING FALSE IDENTIFICATION OR INFORMATION TO AGR AND POSSESSION OR CONSUMPTION OR PURCHASE OF ALCOHOLIC LIQUORS BY MINORS.

Section 3-1 provides definitions to alcoholic liquor and alcoholic beverages, property, public place, writing, and written.

Section 3-2 makes it illegal for persons less than 21 years of age to purchase or attempt to purchase, consume or attempt to consume, possess or attempt to possess, transport or attempt to transport alcoholic liquor. It also provides sanctions and increased sanctions for repeat offenders which includes: fines, suspension, revocation, the suspension of one's drivers license and the impoundment of the vehicle.

Section 3-3 (2) authorizes a police officer to require an underage person to submit to a portable breath test upon reasonable cause. This section sets forth a legal presumption for a blood alcohol level of .02% or more by weight of alcohol.

Section 3-3 makes it illegal for any person to knowingly sell or furnish alcoholic liquor to an underage person. This section establishes the standard of diligent inquiry.

Section 3-7 prohibits a person less than 17 years of age to remain in any place where intoxicating liquor is served unless the minor is accompanied by a parent or guardian. This section also establishes the proprietor's responsibility.

Section 3-8 makes it illegal for any person to furnish false identification to an underage person or for an underage person to use false identification to purchase alcohol. This section sets forth penalties and sanctions, including: fines, costs and imprisonment.
