

Mercy whips Divine Child in league dual meet

Stephanie Cunningham won the 400-meter run (1:05) and helped Farmington Hills Mercy win three relays Tuesday in girls track.

Angka Morris and Jackie Segue were involved in two relay victories each as the Marlins defeated Dearborn Divine Child at Mercy, 92-36.

Cunningham anchored the 800 relay team (1:52.9) that included Angela Morris, Rhashaida Rudolph and Nicole Carter.

Mercy swept the relays as Morris, Rudolph and Carter teamed up with Jami Snow for first place in the 400 relay (52.4).

Morris also won the 100 dash (13.1) with a season-best time and Segue the 3,200 run (8:51).

The Marlins (1-1) had additional firsts with Jami Snow for first in the discus (113.4), Nettie Grondin in the high jump (5-0) and Ashley Fields in the 200 dash (29.5).

On Friday, Mercy was fourth in the nine-team Jackson Invitational. Grand Blanc had 107

points, Jackson Lumen Christi 74, Flint Northern 61, Mercy 59 and East Lansing 48.

Morris was the lone meet champion for the Marlins, winning the 400 run with a season-best time of 1:00.1.

The top five places in each event received medals; the top six received points.

Grondin was second in the high jump (4-10). Morris also was runner-up in the 200 (27.0) and combined with Rudolph, Carter and Segue for second in the 1,600 relay (4:17.5).

Mercy had a pair of fourth-place finishes in the hurdles from Snow, who ran 17.7 and 52.4.

Taking fifth place were Marsha Obinger, discus (85-8); Rudolph, 400 (1:03.5); and Andriola, 3,200 (12:45.9).

Hawks third at Milan

With the April showers missing, the Farmington Harrison girls track team turned in one of its best performances of the year Saturday.

Under sunny skies, the Hawks took third out of six teams at the Puddle Jump Relays at Milan High.

Finckney took first with 98 points, edging South Lyon by two points.

"Finckney and South Lyon are loaded, so we expected and

hoped to come in third place," Harrison coach Mark Babcock said.

"We performed well and received fast times from a distance relay team. It was a very respectable third place."

The Hawks recorded three first-place finishes. The team of Cassie Jimson, Emily Mayberry, Mahogany Fletcher and Devron Kennedy won the 400 relay in 61.4 and the sprint medley relay in 1:53.1.

Lisa Rosemary replaced Fletcher in the shuttle hurdle relay as the team took first in 1:05.2.

Kennedy, Mayberry, Fletcher and Erika Taylor picked up a

second place in the 800 relay (1:50.8).

Harrison also collected four thirds. In the discus, Kerstin Andzrejowski, Erica Berg and Lesley Upton combined for 220 feet, 8 1/2 inches.

The team of Allison Best, Amy Schaner, Jackie Watts and Kristin Schleicher also finished third in the four-mile relay (25:01).

Best, Schleicher, Schaner and Amanda Gardner took third in the 3,200 relay (11:04.2), and Lynn Andzrejowski, Schleicher, Schaner and Taylor were third in the puddle jumper relay (7:21.4).

Phillips and Moore, who have cleared 6-2, and Devin White, who has cleared 6-10.

"By the end of the field events, they could be kicking butt," Baker said.

Jarrett also runs the open 100 meters and could contribute in the sprint relays. The 400 relay is intact with sophomore Reggie Spearman, seniors Steve Hester and Aaron Stephens and Junior Harden James recording the area's second best time at 44.3.

The same will run the 800 with the possible exception of Jarrett, who may be the anchor.

"I imagine we'll probably be put in that role (of favorite)," Glenn coach Jess Shugh said. "We've always been contenders."

If we have a chance to do well, we have to do so in the field events. That's where we've had success and hope anyway to keep doing that."

Salem's strength is in the distance events, where juniors Scott Kingston, Andy Briggs and Ian Seary excel.

Rob Hawley gives the Rocks hope in the hurdles.

"We're going to try to score in every event and by the time the end of the meet comes around, maybe we're hanging around," Baker said. "That's our philosophy."

GC should be boosted by the return of its top thrower, Brian Douglas, who has battled mononucleosis all spring.

Even without Douglas, the Shamrocks have three of the top six shot putters, led by Dan Dominguez with an area best toss of 53-2 1/4. The Shamrocks' foursome of Wayne Brige, Craig Skalski, John Faunce and Chris Laney also have the area's best 3,200 time (8:25.0).

"We should do well in the discus, shot and distance events," Magni said. "According to what you see in the paper and at the Elks Relays where no one was even close, it's going to be Glenn (in first). But I tell my guys if you can't be first, get a trophy. That's our goal."

Harrison's foursome of Keith Battle, Chris Knox, Jerrard Johnson and Jason Sharpe, have

the best time in the 400 relay (43.4) and 800 relay (1:30.3).

Senior Nick Shaisib, who has Observerland's best throw in the discus with a toss of 162-7, gives the Hawks hope in the throwing events.

The Hawks are 4-0 in dual meets and won the Novi and Milan Relays.

"We've always been close but no cigar," Harrison coach John Reed said. "We have strength in our balance. We have ability to score in every event opposed to being just heavy in sprints."

Livonia Stevenson might not challenge in the team standings,

but the Spartans distance relays will be tough. They have the area's best distance runner, Rob Block, clocking the top time in both the 1,600 (4:36) and 3,200 run (9:51.3).


