CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS SUMMARY ORDINANCE

Notice of Adoption of Ordinance C-8-97, an Ordinance to amend Chapter 30, Traffic and Motor Vehicles, Article VII, Vehicle Size, Weight and Load, of the City Code of the City of Farmington Hills, to add definitions and extend regulations of size, weight and load restrictions on vehicles within the City of Farmington Hills and to provide penalties for violation of the Article.

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS ORDAINS:

Section 1.

Chapter 30, Traffic and Motor Vehicles, Article VII, Vehicle Size, Weight and Load, Section 30-761, Definitions, is hereby amended to add appropriate definitions.

Section 30-763, General Prohibition; applicability, of Chapter 30, Traffic and Motor Vehicles, is hereby amended to add sub-section c.

Section 30-765, Trucks, Truck Tractors, Semitrailers, Trailers, is hereby amended.

Section 6.

Section 30-766, Height and Weight of Vehicles.

Section 30-767a, Additional requirements for the transportation of mobile homes.

Section 8.

Section 30-767b, Hauling of semitrailers for sightseeing.

Section 9.

Section 30-768, Spillway load on highway prohibited; logs and tubular products.

Section 10.

Section 30-769, Trailers towed by passenger vehicles; attachment.

Section 11.

Section 30-769a, Wheel and axle loads; designated highways; seasonal restrictions; fire safety; suspension or imposition of restrictions; weight determination; applicability to interstate highways.
