## **Major Metro delivers** hit for women's softball

category); Powell manages the preatigious Southfield-based Close Encounters and is a veteran conference official.

Both men take great pride in their accomplishments and those made by the state's USSSA women's program. There are over 1,000 USSSA-registered teams in Michigan compared with the 10 teams and dwindling tournament numbers Grubb faced when he assumed control of the program.

The Softball City-based Major Metro Conference, currently enjoying its 15th season, is the state's premier women's softball league and the second oldest existing league in the women's USSSA program. Players from Oakland, Wayne and Macombounties — some have even come from Lansing and Kalamazo — grace this talent-laden travel league, and many of the teams often figure in the national USSSA rankings. Some, like Close Encounters, éven gain national championship status.

"There are a lot of players out there that want to play, but they just have to have a place to play," Grubb mid. They have to make it interesting for them. These are, talented, dedicated eithetes. A lot of them would players gift days a veck if there were cight years never gift of playing.

"Anywhere this league goes the teams and players get reapper," he added. "People

the teams and players get respect," he added. "People around the state know about the league and they know about teams like Close Encounters." Incidentally, Powell's Lady Encounters swept a doublehead-er from Grubb's Cougars last Thursday. It meant two more wins for the two-time defending Major Metro champions, coming off one of their best seasons ever.

In its 17th official season, Close Encounters is recognized as one of the oldest and successful existing softball clubs in the tri-county area.

"Wo're just like one big family," said Katrina Belcher, who came on board in 1983 and has played every field position except cathor. Other teams are always gunning to beat Close Encounters, but we've carned that tradition."

Indeed, Powell's close-knit teams have always excelled on the diamond - particularly the previous three seasons.

Bin 1998, the powerhouse Lady Encounters capture the coveted No. 1 national ranking in Class B and place second with a 7-2 record at the 24-team Divisional Tournament in Shopherdsville, Ky. The history-making season also includes 64-12 overall and 24-1 Major Metro records.
