Seestadt hit-a grand slam in the first inning of the second game, sending him on his way to a 4-for-4 performance that also featured three singles.


Seestadt's grand slam cleared the left field fence and didn't stop until it nearly made it across the street to Silver Vii-lage, a retirement community.
