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Storm fills basements, cuts power

BY TODU WICKS STAFF WARTS Farrwington-area residents emerged relatively unseathed from one of the worst storms in Michigan history Wednesday evening. Torandees, lightning and high winds raged through Sagimaw, Onkland, Mncomb and Wayne countics, con-tributing to the deaths of at least nine people and the destruction of countiess homes, buildings and proper-ty. However, local damage accenced to mostly consist of flooded basements and people without power. "We made out protty good, 1 think," said Gary Gosa, Farmington director of public safeks, "Tree limbs down, things like that, no major damage." As of Thursday morning, the Farmington/Farming-ton Hills area had about 9,400 of the 220,000 power outages in Southeast Michigan. Callers to the Detroit Edison Customer Service line were told that 90 per-cent of these would be restored by lato Friday. "We will be working well through the day on Satur-day to complete the restored by lato Friday. Being brought in from other states to get the job dome."

done." Farmington Hills police had extra personnel on duty Wednesday evening to handle emorgency calls and deal with complications from the storm. "The majority of the calls were from citizens report-ing malfunctioning traffic signals and flooding base-ments," said Hills Police Chief William Dwyer, "including my own. I worked on it until 2 a.m." It was estimated that about two inches of rain fell within an hour in Farmington Hills. Many ditches and storm drains were overloaded, which resulted in many
