

POLICE AND FIRE CALLS

Listed below are some of the Farmington-area police incidents in the past week.

MARIJUANA POSSESSION

In Farmington Hills:

Police arrested three Farmington Hills men, ages 20, 20 and 23, for marijuana use and possession contributing to the delinquency of minors after officers broke up a pot party at Farmington Mobile Manor around 4 a.m. July 18. Police found the man smoking a cigar-sized joint surrounded by a semicircle of people. A plastic bag containing more than 50 grams of marijuana was confiscated. Three men and two 15-year-old girls were taken into custody. One of the girls was a runaway from Wayne County. Both were released to their parents.

A Harper Woods man, 40, was ticketed for driving with a suspended license and possessing 1.5 grams of marijuana during a traffic stop on Northwestern and Clairview.

A Canton man, 35, was ticketed for marijuana possession after finding 6 grams of the drug in the 1997 Eagle SLV he was driving on Northwestern and Nottingham Knoll at 6:20 p.m. July 19. Police stopped the vehicle for squealing tires.

BREAK INS

In Farmington Hills: Several items including \$125 cash, sunglasses and a cellular phone were stolen after the window was broken out of a 1995 Plymouth Voyager parked inside a Plumbrook residence garage July 18.

An Audiotex car phone and factory AM/FM CD player along with 50 CDs were stolen after punching the door lock with a screwdriver on a 1996 Chevy Blazer parked on 12 Mile Road July 18, causing \$1,000 damage.

THEFT

In Farmington Hills: Three wheel covers worth \$190 were stolen from a 1996 Geo parked outside of Kendallwood Apartments between July 16-17. Thirteen pagers worth \$1,105 were stolen from Pagenet on 12 Mile Road between July 17-18.

A sum of \$211 in cash was stolen from a woman's purse at Ameritech on Northwestern July 11.

A cordless drill, hammer drill, saw and tool box were stolen out of the bed of 1990 Dodge Dakota truck parked at the Comfort Inn on 12 Mile between July 18-20.

Two air bags worth \$1,100 were stolen from a 1996 Toyota Camry parked at Bob Saks Toyota on Grand River between July 17-21, causing \$300 damage.

BAD CHECKS

In Farmington Hills: A Detroit man and woman, 20, were arrested after an attempt to cash a fraudulent check for \$964 at Comerica Bank on Eight Mile July 18. Bank employees became suspicious after the "AAA" markings looked sloppy on the check. They called

AAA, which confirmed the check was bogus and said that \$12,000 worth of bad checks had been cashed in the past two weeks.

AUTO THEFT

In Farmington Hills: A \$3,500 blue 1982 Olds Cutlass was stolen from the parking lot at Buggy Works Restaurant on Orchard Lake between 9:30-10:30 a.m. July 18.

A blue 1994 Pontiac minivan was stolen from the Holiday Inn on 10 Mile between 6:30 p.m. July 17 and 10:30 July 18.

A \$39,750 1997 Audi A6 was stolen from the lot at Bill Cook on Grand River July 18.

HOME BURGLARY

In Farmington Hills: Two TVs, leather coat and leather jacket were stolen after a Cordoba Apartments residence was burglarized July 18. There was no sign of forced entry.

A pager, hand-held phone, check book and man's wallet were stolen after a Gateway Apartments residence was broken into between 7 p.m. and midnight July 18.

DRUNKEN DRIVING

In Farmington Hills: Police made four arrests for drunken driving between July 18-21, including a Waterford man, 34, for operating a 1993 BMW while intoxicated on eastbound Nine Mile and Haggerty at 4 p.m. July 18. Officers stopped the vehicle after Novi police notified them to be on the lookout for a white BMW driving erratically. The man had a blood alcohol level of .21 percent, which is more than twice the legal limit of .1 percent.

A Detroit man, 43, was also arrested after police responded to a rollover accident on M-5 and

Orchard Lake at 3:30 a.m. July 19. Police found a 1983 Ford F-Series truck with the windshield smashed and roof caved in upside down in a ditch. The driver, standing nearby, complained of being sore all over. Officers smelled alcohol on him and his eyes were bloodshot. A beer bottle was also found near the scene. He said he wasn't wearing a seatbelt and thought he had been on I-696. He refused to take a breathalyzer, but his blood was later drawn at Botsford Hospital where he was treated.

VANDALISM

In Farmington Hills: Between 20-25 paintballs were fired at the front door area of the Farmington Hills Ice Arena July 19. A vehicle was seen leaving the parking lot at a high rate of speed.

The rear window was smashed on a 1990 Chevy Lumina parked on Briarwyke July 20, causing \$200 damage.

A window was broken on a Ford Windstar parked at Uncle Eds Oil Shoppe on 12 Mile and Orchard Lake July 20, causing \$300 damage.

In Farmington: A resident in the 34000 block of Oakland reported that someone stabbed his mailbox with a 13-inch knife, sometime between 4:30-6:55 p.m. Sunday, July 13.

Two juvenile boys, one age 14 and a former boyfriend of the resident's daughter, were questioned by detectives. Later, it was decided that no charges would be levied against the boys. They were told to stay away from the residence and to replace the mailbox, which they have already done, and public safety spokesman Mike Wiggins.

"The person who reported it is

satisfied the parents (of the two boys) will take care of their kids," Wiggins said.

An unknown amount of cash was stolen after the front door was kicked at Donstor Mobile Storage Systems on Indoplex between July 18-20.

URINATING IN PUBLIC

In Farmington Hills:

A Farmington Hills man, 25, was arrested for disorderly conduct and urinating in public at the Botsford Hospital gazebo area 6:30 p.m. July 21 after staff there said a man started yelling obscenities and threatening an employee, who had to be treated for chest pains and heart palpitations. When police arrived, the man was urinating in the parking lot. He started to scream obscenities and stated he was God. He was arrested and, while in the holding cell, he took off all his clothes and washed them in the sink and toilet while he repeatedly urinated on the floor. A cousin said his behavior was out of character for the man, who was in the military. He was taken to V.A. Hospital for psychiatric evaluation.

PROWLER REPORT

In Farmington:

It was reported about 10 p.m. Sunday that a resident in the 34000 block of Oakland heard a noise outside her bedroom. Her father ran out and saw a middle-aged man who kept on running toward Gill Street, despite his shouts. When the father caught up to the man at the corner of Oakland-Gill, the resident found he was wearing a Walkman radio, jogging through the neighborhood and not a suspect.

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
