## Vote-rich Oakland key to petition drive

Kathryn Mogle doesn't have her petitions yet. But when she gets them, she plans an all-out individual elfort to get the right to physician-assisted suicide on the 1998 state ballot.

'I'm only one person," said the Berkley resident. 'But I plan tog ou pand down my neighborhood. I've never done anything like this before, but it's an important issue to me. I saw my mother wishing to die.

Dorothy Conrad, a Birmingham resident, said she too will circulate petitions as part of Merian's Friends, the Ann Arbor based group that on Tuesday officially kieked off it's statewide petition drive.

'I firmly believe anybody with a clear mind ought to have the right to decide for himself or herself,' said Conrad, a former Birmingham mayor.

Merian's Priends — with retired physician and former Michigan State Senater Edward off the long awaited petition drive with press conforences in Detroit and other cities.

None of the conforences were held in Oakland County, something Farmington Hills resident Jan Dolan said was an oversight, rather than a sub.

"We certainly waith' ignore Oakland County," and Jolan, a former state representative who

## Initial response supports an assisted suicide ballot

Some people, were a bit suspi-cious, but far more were support-ive and enthusiastic, according to Judy Michaels, a clinical social worker who circulated petitions to legalize physician nessisted suicide Tuesday at the Orchard Lake Mail in West Bloomfield.
"In a matter of two hours, I personally filled four petitions," said Michaels, "If I would have had more petitions. I could have

Michaels is a member of Meri-Michaels is a memoer of Nern's Friends, the organization that formally kicked off its petition drive on behalf of physician assisted suicide Tuesday. The Ann Arbor based organization hopes to get 350,000 valid signatures — 100,000 more than the required minimum — to put

a referendum on physician assisted suicide on the 1998 baltot in Michigan.
Michaels also circulated petitions last week at the Art Fair in
Ann Arbor, where she and other

garnered an estimated 4,100 signatures.

Michaels said she doesn't believe physician assisted suicide will ever be universally accepted or even the preferred option. "But I firmly believe that anybody who is terminally ill should have physician assisted suicide as a predictable option."
