a cigar humidor, featuring boxes of Arture Fuente and Partagas cigars, plus Macanudo Double & Cigars (\$365 each) in individual wooden cases. The humidor, said Dicker, includes a water system that blows moist air up into the case, to keep cigars fresh.

"These arent' el cheapo cigars, the kind that smell terrible and make you turn green right away," explained Dicker, "These cigars are extremely well made. The flavor and aroma are more smooth, more rich. You can't even tell they're smoking in hero."

For customers who don't care for even an unoffensive puff of cigar smoke, however, there is plenty of dining space for non-smokers. (Non-beef caters also should know that Carvers serves up chicken, fish, lamb chops, veal chops, loaves of bread with butter baked right in, desserts and salads.)
