"The youth centers are places where young people, ages 11 through 15, can go after school or on the weekends and enjoy a variety of positive recreational and social activities," said Todd Lipa, coordinator of Farmington Hills area youth services program. "They are places where kids can start finding their true potential instead of finding trouble."

Artists exhibit, sell work

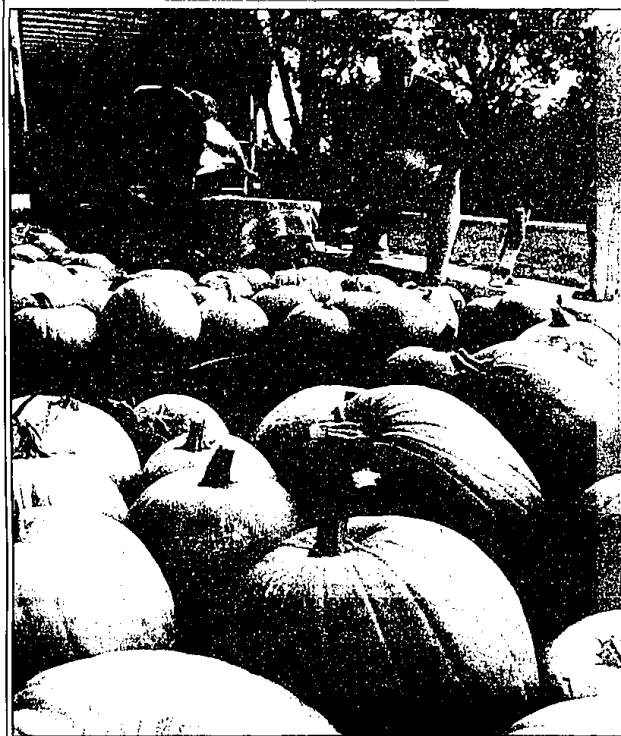
The Farmington Artists Club exhibit and sale is scheduled Thursday, Nov. 6 through Sunday, Nov. 9.

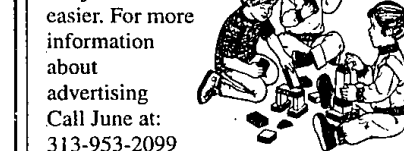
