The Oakland County mail

ALTERNATIVE SENTENCING
The Oakland County Board of
Commissioners has unanimously
papraved a recommendation submitted by the county administration to expand the highly successful Weekend Alternatives for
hiddemeanant (WAM) program. A pretrial services investigator
will be added, with the cost of
the new position partially paid
for from special feea assessed to
participants in the program.
Along with freeing up jail space,
the WAM program has saved
taxpayers almost \$42,000, said
County Executive L. Brooks Patterson's staff. The program is
geared toward nonviolent offenders who spend their weekends
involved in maintenance and
elegnup projects in county parks,
court offices and law enforcement departments.

## GLEANERS BOOST

Gleaners Community Food Blank's newly initiated \$3 million drive for endowment has been given a significant boost with a grant of \$150,000 from the Detroit-based Matilda Wilson

Fund. The Gleaners Endowment was established to allow the food bank to meet the growing challenge of hunger in southeastern Michigan in the years to come. Gleaners and its member agencies currently provide more than 300,000 meals a week to poor and hungry people. More than 41 percent of those served are children. The Matilda Wilson Fund, which has broad purposes, was established in 1944 by Matilda and Alfred Wilson, who built Meadow Brook Hall in the 1920s in Rochester Hills.

It now is co-sponsored nationally by more than 35 organizations.




