Among those in the near-capacity crowd were Shirley and John Richardson and Dick Tupper. Up front were ex-mayors Bill Hartsock, Arnold Campbell and the person who passed the gavel to her, JoAnne McShane.

Bush's first official act amayor was to present McShane with an engraved gavel, a dozen roses and some flowery campliments.

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
