said, "They were compassionate enough to talk to the victim's mother to tell her this (case) has not been forgotten. ... They did an excellent job."

Ongoing investigation

But the Farmington Hills police chief, who called the McKelton case "one of the priority cases," emphasized that the investigation is continuing.

"We feel there is a possibility that at least one other suspect was involved," Dwyer said. "This also does not end the pursuit of other criminal cases against Mr. McKelton."

Dwyer added that there is a \$47,500 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of other suspects.

Dwyer said the first key to McKelton's indictment was evidence McKelton left behind fol-

lowing the March 12, 1997, armed robbery of Tappan's Diamonds and Finn Jewelry in the Orchard Mall in West Bloomfield. Several shots were fired, with shell casings matching those recovered outside the Comerica ATM, where Bosley was shot down.

The second key was a 9 mm handgun with McKelton's fingerprints on it, found in May 1997 at Walnut Lake and Inkster - following a second robbery of Tappan's.

McKelton was arrested last July in Dearborn, following a massive manhunt. He pleaded guilty in Oakland County Circuit Court to charges of armed robbery and using a gun to commit the crime. He is serving sentences of four years and two years for the respective charges.

"Allow me to reiterate what I have said since the murder of Duane Bosley," Dwyer said. "Mr. Bosley was an unarmed service technician who was viciously ambushed without provocation."

The indictment was announced by Chief Assistant United States Attorney Alan

Gershel and Oakland County Prosecutor David Goreyca.

Joint investigation

Gershel and Goreyca stated that the indictment resulted from a joint investigation conducted by the FBI, Michigan State Police, Farmington Hills, West Bloomfield, Southfield and Troy police departments, Oakland County Sheriff's Department and the Detroit Police Violent Crimes Task Force.

"The citizens of Oakland County can be proud of the professionalism and commitment of the agencies which comprised the task force," said Goreyca during Tuesday's press conference in Detroit about the indictment.

"Cooperation between these agencies was critical in solving this case."

An indictment is only a charge and is not evidence of guilt.

The case was presented to the grand jury by assistant U.S. Attorney Michael Leibson and Oakland County Assistant Prosecutor Paul Walton, who was appointed a special assistant U.S. attorney.

Although a change in reporting procedures at the state level added around 1,000 additional crimes to those the department already deals with, he said, there still was an 8.4 percent reduction overall in the 20 most serious or Group A crimes.

The classification, which includes murder, forcible sex offenses, robbery and narcotics violations, declined overall from 5,618 incidents/offenses in 1996 to 5,142 last year, the report said.

Although forcible sex offenses increased 20.6 percent, Dwyer noted such offenses "were almost exclusively committed by persons known to the victims and are outside the control of the police department."

Overall, the annual report showed a 2.1 percent increase in crime, which Dwyer said is expected due to yearly population increases, additional traffic crashes, more sick and injured complaints and additional police officer activities.

The increase showed a 21.5 percent jump in Group B incidents/offenses, which include operating a vehicle under the

influence of alcohol and liquor-law violations, and a 2.5 percent rise in Group C, which includes traffic crashes and offenses and juvenile complaints.

Liquor violations jumped 75.6 percent and local ordinance violations 26.1 percent in Group B, but the chief said those increases "are reflective of aggressive policing and more officers discovering offenses" while on patrol.

The increase in Group C, which also covers warrants, complaints about animals, burglar alarms and police helping the sick and injured, was in part attributable to non-criminal offenses and increased calls to police for service, he said.

He admitted concern over increases in weapons and narcotics offenses (4.9 percent and 16.8 percent, respectively), but noted officers arrested more suspects possessing weapons and drugs.

He also pointed out more robberies were committed by people with guns.

On the positive side in Group A, vandalism decreased 31.4 percent and burglary totals annual-

ly have declined for 13 of the last 14 consecutive years. The increase was a slight one in 1996.

Dwyer said the department benefited from upgrades in technology such as live-scan fingerprinting, which is an automated, inkless system that has enhanced the mug-shot imaging system.

He said the department also was the first in Michigan to purchase an advanced driver-training simulator.

Dwyer said the motor carrier enforcement program "will help the city recover costs" of Farmington Hills road damaged by overweight trucks.

And he said that while increased traffic boosted traffic accidents by 9.3 percent, alcohol in traffic crashes was reduced by more than 17.6 percent.

During the year, the department, which has foot and bicycle patrols in addition to motorized patrols, won community policing awards from the Michigan Municipal League, the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police and the National League of Cities.
