

Schrock pitches Harrison to 8-1 win

Leslie Schrock pitched a complete game and earned his second victory of the week Friday, leading Farmington to an 8-1 softball victory over visiting Northville.

Schrock (2-0) scattered five hits, limited the walks to three and struck out two. Northville's win was earned. The win keeps the Hawks tied for first place with Livonia, Churchill and Plymouth Canton in the Western Division of the Western Lakes Activities Association. All three teams are 3-1.

Harrison had nine hits, including two apiece by Brittany Maxey, Becky Vosler and Kaitlin Vitale. The Hawks (4-2) were active on the bases and stole 13. Vitale had three stolen bases, Maxey, Vosler and Ari Ault, two each. Maxey, who had two RBI, and Ault scored two runs each.

Vosler also threw two runners out at first base from right field.

Harrison scored three runs in the second and third innings and added two more in the sixth. Northville made five errors.

Schrock pitched four innings Wednesday and was the winner against visiting Livonia Stevenson, 12-4. She allowed four hits, walked one and struck out one.

The Hawks backed her with 18 hits. Maxey was 4-for-4 with a triple and

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 25, OF THE CITY CODE OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON, TO PROHIBIT THE CONSTRUCTION OR LOCATION OR PROJECTING SIGNS WITHIN THE CITY.

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

Section 1. Section 25-4, Permitted signs, of Chapter 25, Signs, is hereby amended to read sub-section (3) Projecting signs, only. Subsequent sub-sections of Section 25-4 shall be renumbered to maintain numerical continuity.

Section 2. Section 25-13, Prohibited signs, of chapter 25, Signs, is hereby amended to add a new sub-section, (6), which shall read as follows:
