1. Senator Jack Faxon's school is called "The International School."
 2. The cost of mailing a first class letter in 1973 was 8 cents.
 3. The Activities Center is named the William Costick Center after the former city manager.

 5. Hard-Cover publications of the Farmington Hills Historian

13. Fred M. Warner was the only Michigan Governor from Farmington.
