Eaglets to compete on world stage

Orchard Lake St. Mary's Senior Eight crew, which has conquered the state, nation and continent, has a chance to stake its claim as the world's best high school Senior Eight crew at the Henley Royal Regatta on the Thames River in England July 1-5. The squad will depart from Detroit's Metro Airport tomorrow and Farmington Rills "It's the creme do la creme," sixth-year coach Kevin Van Houten said. "The Henley is a world-

class regatta. There will be several events with Olympians participating and we'll have the best high schools from all over the world there."

The qualifying runs will begin on June 29 with a 32-team field and will continue until the two finalists race down the Thames on July 5 for the ultimate prize – the Princess Elizabeth Cup.

The Eaglets' Senior Eight is undefeated in seven regattes this season, including the Grand Rapids High School Invitational, the Hebda Memorial Challenge (Detroit River), the Wyandotte Regatta (Detroit River), the

Midwest Scholastic Rowing Championship (Cincinnati), the Statesbury Cup Regatta (Philadelphia), the Canadian Championships and most recently the U.S. National (Gincinnati), where they covered 2,000 meters in 5:40 in what Van Houten called the team's "biggest challenge," because the Eaglets were the only team with members all from the same school.

"The other teams, were what are known as 'composite boats,' comprised of a collection of the best individual high school rowers in a region or area," Van Houten said."

The Scnior Eight team will be without one of its regular teammates and the boat it has used all season in Great Britain.

Dan Lee is not eligible due to his age and "Charlie," the 60-foot, 190-pound shell they've used in each victory could not be shipped oversees, because the team wasn't able to make arrangements in time. Since Van Houten's alma mater, Grand Valley State, will also be participating in the Henley, he arranged to rent and share its boat. The St. Mary's crew includes coxewain Eric Aldrich (Commerce); senior stoker Michael Filipiak (West Bloomfield), senior Dave Simon (W. Bloomfeld), junior Hait Abisaid (Farmington Held), junior Matt Walle (South Lyon), senior Chris Thompson (Wixom) and junior Shawn Riley (While Lake).
