Adams, believed to be the driver in the getaway vehicle, also was charged with fleeing and eluding police officers.

All were in 47th District Judge Marle Parker's courtroom Friday when the examination was postponed to give McCarthy enough time to get up to speed with the felony case. Assistant prosecutor Elizabeth Chisholm said discovery for the case amounts to a stack of police reports and witness statements measuring 1 102 inches thick.

After the attorneys discussed the matter with their clients, all said they would agree to waive the rule stipulating that preliminary examinations must take

place within 14 days of arraign-

place within 14 days of arraignment.

Meanwhile, it took more than three hours for Friday's abbreviated session to begin.

Most of the morning, defense attorneys Otis Culpepper and Gerald Evelyn, who represent York and Carter, respectively, sat in the court corridor waiting for a third attorney to show up. Eventually, McCarthy was found. But then, his selection had to go through proper approval procedures with Oakland County Circuit Court.

Additional time was spent waiting for the defendants to arrive from the Oakland County Jail.

All three attorneys then convinced Parker that the case needed to be delayed. McCarthy saked for a week postponement, because he begins another case in circuit court Monday.

"I understand there are a lot of witnesses here," McCarthy said.
"But I was just appointed... I'm very anxious about going forward at this time without boing properly prepared."

Parker continued \$500,000 corporate surety bonds for each defendant.

The armed robbery began about 6:25 a.m. Aug. 3 at the 10 Mile-Grand River Denny's, when three men entered wearing bandannas on their faces. They announced a hold-up to employees and five customers and displayed a weapon inside a duffel bag.

Employees and customers were bound with duct tape and ordered to lay on the floor in the women's bathroom for 10 minutes. No one was injured.
Southfield and Farmington

Hills police stopped three men, in a Volkswagen Jetta, with the assistance of a Denny's employee who called police from a cellular telephone in the restaurant parking lot. The witness then followed the Volkswagen, trailing behind at a safe distance, advising police of the suspects whereabouts until they caught up.

Police recovered money from the ear and on the suspects, and later found a gun, bandannas and gloves.

The three defendants are pects in similar recent incidents in other communities, including Southfield, Lathrup Village and Livonia.

Approximately 10 friends or acquaintances of the defendants sat in the courtroom for the pystonement. All were scanned with a hand-held metal detector before entering the courtroom. A court officer said they were checked for weapons because of suspected links to gang activity.
