It certainly is best under such circumstances to be on the safe side.

This week the teachers of the state are in attendance at the State Institute which is being held in Detroit.

The law provides that the schools shall be closed during Thursday, and Friday, the two days the meeting is held, provided the teachers desire to attend.

Statement from the Health Officer

Owing to the danger of an epidemic of diphtheria spreading in the community the Board of Health feel it their duty to interdict all public gatherings of whatsoever kind, secular or sacred, in the village, until further notice.

The Board also earnestly requests the citizens of the community to prevent as far as possible even private gatherings in private homes.

It is not the wish of the board to hinder in any way the necessary business and commercial life of the community and feels convinced that there is little or no danger of spreading the infection by simple personal conversations or meetings necessary for ordinary business transactions, and expresses that conviction here for the encouragement of the community's necessary commercial life.
