Donors line up to help build up dwindling blood supplies

Sarah Primeau never donated blood before. But then she heard about the emergency need for donations, and was one of many first-timers to show up Monday at the Facunington Hills Fire Headquarters.

"It's not exactly enjoyable," Primeau said, reclining on a bench after donating her pint, one of 185 collected at the Orchard Luke-11 Mile facility. "But it's worth it, because I heard they (American Red Cross) were short of blood.

Primeau, an employee at Novi Community Credit Union, said several colleagues were also coming out to the blood drive. Among them was her boss, Bob Hinberg, vice president at the credit union.

"This is important," Primeau said. "Til do it again."
The blood drive also brought out voterans such as Dians Gaydek of Northville, an employee for the city of Farmington Hills.
"I think if everybody did it they wouldn't have these pleas constantly" about needing to alleviate the blood shortage, Gaydek said. Everybody here today needs to come back."

Dedicated donors

According to Diane Risko of the American Red Cross, bad weather contributed to a slow start Monday. But activity increased during the late afternoon and

activity increased during the late afternoon and evening.

"It was a very successful drive," Risko said. "... Whad many first-time donors."

The donated blood, separated into plastic pouches for platelets, red blood cells and plasma, was immediately shipped to the Red Cross' main offices in downtown Detroit to be tested, Risko said. Blood determined to be healthy then is transported to hospitals, where it is almost immediately used.

"It (blood) may go by taxi, that's how low the supply as soon as it's processed."


"The December holidays, and early January snowstorms, contributed to the region's emergency blood bank being in the worst shape it's been in 15 years, Risko said earlier. The blood bank serves 64 hospitals.
