

Falcons earn 1st league victory

Junior center Justin Millus scored a game-high 25 points Tuesday as Farmington earned their first Western Lakes Athletic Association victory in boys basketball at the expense of host Livonia Churchill, 65-63 in overtime.

"We couldn't contain Millus; he did a nice job in the low post," Churchill coach Rick Austin said. "We didn't do a good job of rebounding."

Chad Senborn and Matt Mikel contributed 10 points each for Falcons, who let a 40-34, third-quarter lead slip away.

Junior forward John Bennett, who led Churchill with 17 points, hit a three-pointer to send the game into overtime.

Devin White and Ryan Vickers added 14 and 11 points, respectively, for Churchill, which missed a chance to win it with three shots at the end of regulation.

The Falcons are 1-4 in the WLA and 4-7 overall. The Chargers remain winless in the WLA through five games and have a 3-0 overall record.

HARRISON 82, LAKELAND 79: The Hawks (7-5) needed two overtimes Tuesday to overcome the host Eagles, outscoring Lakeland 8-5 in the second extra session.

Senior Andrew Burr scored a game-high 30 points, including the winning basket and accompanying free throw with 12 seconds remaining. He also had

15 rebounds, four assists and five steals.

Senior Lamar Wilson had five points in the second overtime and finished with 12. Junior Brian Nelson, who had two key baskets to tie the score, posted six of his 11 points in the fourth quarter. Lakeland led 16-10 after one quarter, but Harrison came back to take a 33-30 halftime lead.

The Eagles outscored the Hawks 13-10 in the third period and 22-20 in the fourth to make up the difference.

The score was knotted at 63-63 at the end of regulation time and 74-74 at the end of the first overtime.

Senior Dan Bahr scored 25 points, which included making 12 of 16 free throws, to lead Lakeland (6-7).

Mike Schlotter's basket for the Eagles with 0:1 left on the clock tied the score at 63 and sent the game into overtime. He also made a layup at the buzzer to force a second overtime. Schlotter finished with 20 points.

"It was wild and wooly; nobody could stop anybody," Harrison coach Mike Teichman said.

Junior Joe Hundley came off the bench to give the Hawks a lift, scoring five of his eight points in overtime and helping on the glass.

"He's 6-foot-5 and his long arms got us some rebounds when we had physical three guys," Teichman said, adding Hundley had a big stand in the first overtime that led to a basket.

On Saturday, the Hawks traveled to Grand Rapids to play Forest Hills Central (7-4), coached by former Harrison star Ken George, in Van Andel Arena.

Chris Timmons scored 27 points to lead the host Rangers to a 78-52 victory. Central led 10-11 after one quarter, 42-25 at halftime and 58-40 at the end of the third.

Burr scored 15 points, Wilson 11. Nick Hall 10 and Falzone Porter eight for the Hawks, who were 1-0-0 from three-point distance while the Rangers were 0-2-2.

Burr also had six rebounds and Hall five. Central had a 23-21 edge on the boards. The Rangers also made 25 of 32 free throws, the Hawks 15 of 31.

BRIGHTON 87, N. FARMINGTON 49: After a solid start, the Raiders were outscored 32-14 in the middle quarters and ended up losing Tuesday to the host Bulldogs.

North owned a 22-12 lead at the end of the first quarter, but Brighton climbed within a point at halftime, 28-27, and went ahead after three periods, 44-36.

Farmington Hills is seeking qualifications for services to assist with Storm Water Sampling and Analysis. The study is part of the Rouge River National Wet Weather Demonstration Project being administered by Wayne County.

Objective: The objective of this demonstration project is to determine the impact of catch basin cleaning on water quality in the Rouge River watershed and how effective this maintenance activity is in reducing pollutants from storm water runoff.

Location: This project will be confined to portions of the City of Farmington Hills that lie within the Bell Branch and Tarnabush Creek watersheds.

Project Tasks: Project tasks include development of a written plan in accordance with the requirements of the Rouge Program Office (RPO). The Work Plan shall include the methods for determining the impact of catch basin cleaning on storm water runoff as well as a description of your proposal for sampling and analysis (type, location, frequency, test methods, etc.). The consultant shall also develop supplemental specifications for the DPW's catch basin cleaning to ensure that the catch basin cleaning and storm water sampling/analysis will properly coordinate. The engineering consultant shall monitor the progress of the study, maintain appropriate files, and prepare both a draft and final project report.

Regulations: This project must be conducted in compliance with the provisions of the Federal Water Quality Control Act, as amended, Michigan Act 451, Public Act 1994, and all other applicable regulations; local, state, and Federal.
