No. I don't think it's a good deal. That's because I am not willing to giving up the personal information Gross and his online croaics want.

To be eligible for one of the free Presnrie systems, users must promise to use the computers at least 10 hours per month and to view advertisements that will be displayed constantly down the right side of the 15-inch screen, whether they are connected to the Internet or not.

Free-PC.com says it has figured out a way that lets them track just how often the computers are used, what they're used

ers are used, what they're used for and, in particular, what

adventisements users read and what products they buy online. The people belind the promotion say the marketing information collected from users will be kept separate from their actual identities. They explain that the data collected from 10,000 people is valuable to advertisers because it allows them to measure carefully what online pitches people best respond by actually buying.

How valuable? You'may be surprised. The Compaq system being given away retails for under \$1,000. But can you imagine the price break Free-PC.com gots whon buying so many, 10,000 at one time? Thue, it turns out that those free PCs aren't ag valuable as the demographic information collected.
