In the block, she said, students would develop more hands-on activities in class; incorporate technology more consistently; have more chances for complete laboratories and lessons in a session; benefit from a lower teacher-pupil ratio.

Brown, answering parents at the meeting, said the type of statistical-based evaluation of block being done at Parmington High School has morit.
