Researcher in Holocaust banking lawsuit to speak

On Aug. 13, Jewish groups, Swiss banks and lawyers for Holocaust survivors reached a historic \$1.2 billion settlement tover claims to assets lost during World War II.

Miriam Kleiman, senior researcher for the law firm that represented the survivors against the 'Big Three' Swiss banks, worked exclusively on the survivors' class action lawsuit. She will speak at Adat Shalom Synagogue 7:30 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 28.

The lawsuit was initiated when Holocaust survivor Gisalla Weisschaus sued the banks in October 1996. Three months later, litigation grow into classaction suits representing 31,500 plaintiffs worldwide after a Swiss bank employee reacued Holocaust-radocuments from a shredder room at Union Bank in Zurich, Switzerland.
