Researcher in Holocaust banking lawsuit to speak

On Aug. 13, Jewish groups, Swiss banks and lawyers for Holocaust survivors reached a historic \$1.2 billion settlement over claims to assets lost during World War II.

Miriam Kleiman, senior researcher for the law firm that represented the survivors against the "Big Three" Swiss banks, worked exclusively on the survivors' class action lawsuit. She will speak at Adat Shalom Synagogue 7:30 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 28.

The lawsuit was initiated when Holocaust survivor Gisella Weischaus sued the banks in October 1996. Three months later, litigation grew into class-action suits representing 31,500 plaintiffs worldwide after a Swiss bank employee rescued Holocaust-era documents from a shredder room at Union Bank in Zurich, Switzerland.

Kleiman's research for Cohen, Milstein, Hausfeld and Toll was fundamental to the lawsuit. She has appeared on "Good Morning America" and other news pro-

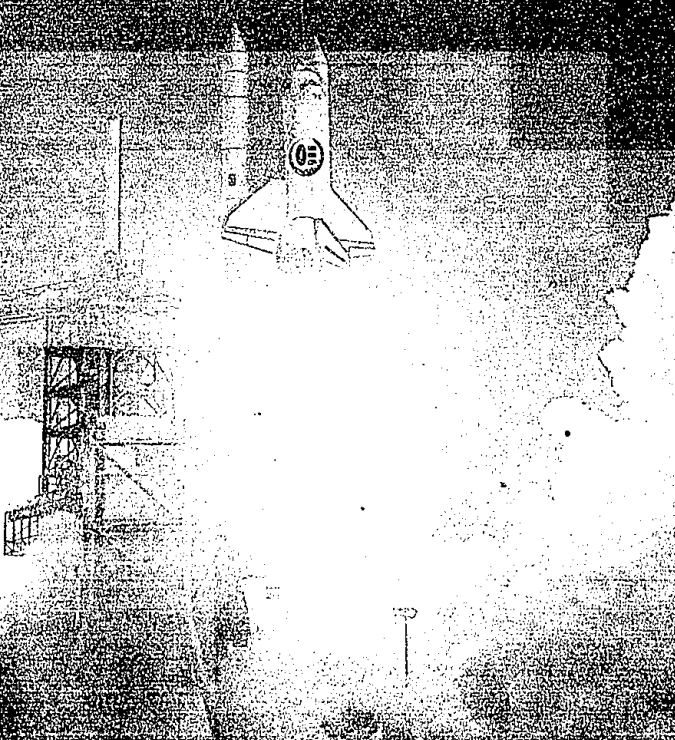
grams. Before devoting herself to the Swiss Banks issue, Kleiman worked for the American Jewish Committee and spent four years as a research analyst at the American Israel Public Affairs Committee. Prior to AIPAC, she worked on Capitol Hill for Sen. Carl Levin.

Originally from Cleveland, Kleiman graduated with honors from the University of Michigan

and earned a bachelor of arts degree in political science. She also attended Hebrew University in Jerusalem.
