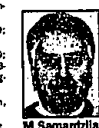
Linovia Parents of the Visually Impaired will stage their second annual Bowltown March 6 at Woodland Lanes in Livonia.

Timing important to proper delivery

Mike Samardzija, owner of the K & S Bowling & Trophy on Eight Mile Road in Livonia, has quite a track record of his own in bowling, having competed on the Pro Bowlers Tour with three regional titles and one national title on the senior tour.

He has had four sanctioned 300s and his best series was 803.

He is in the GDBA Hall of Fame and the Michigan Majors Hall of Fame.

Mike tells us: "For most of the people who come in for lessons, it is most often a lack of the fundamentals. A simple matter of timing. Where in the approach steps, do you start the arm swing?"

"I always ask people how many steps do you take in the approach? That's the key. It is not knowing.

"Timing is essential in that the arm and the foot must arrive at the line at the same time.

"In a four-step approach, start the swing with the first step, with a five step delivery, start it

on the second step. Without proper timing, you lose directional control.

"To correct the timing, push away with the start of the first step. Try not to grip the ball too hard, this makes it more work and less accurate.

"Most of the time other bowlers will give advice to someone who is struggling, but more likely it is the wrong advice. Even a very good bowler who is in a slump should take a look at their timing.

"Keep it simple. Let the weight and swing of the ball provide the speed and the timing will take care of the accuracy. The fundamentals are easy, it's just a matter of learning the correct timing on the approach.

"A common error, for some people who hold the ball for the first couple of steps, they are always late with the ball at the line.

"The best thing to do is find out where you can get proper coaching so you can enjoy the better scores you will get when you do it right."
