of students within three miles in Farmington Hills. At Harrison High, five students in an Advanced Place-ment English class are positive, articulate and confi-dent about the future, he said.

A microcosm

At O'Connell School in Sarah Fisher Center, another exceptional teacher oversees children ages 6-10, who are frightened and pessimistic.

"This incredible contradiction plays out time and time again throughout this community," Maxfield said. "We have here some of America's most fortunate and some of its more challenged students. We are indeed a microcosm of society."
