On-line: If you have a computer and modem, you may place your own holds on-line. Call us if you need instructions.



resume in April, and Stuncher said he expects that phase of the project to be open to the public by no later than Aug. 1.

"It's getting very close," Stuncher said.

In the meantline, \$20 million has been set and for the third phase of the project, connecting the four to six-lane highway from 14 Mile to Pontiac Trail. That phase hieludes whelming Fontiac Trail at the intersection between M-5 and Haggerty Road to 5-lanes (Stuccher said).

While the final phase of the project in still being designed, Stuccher said he expects the project to be bid out late this year with construction beginning in 2000.

When the roadway, which runs parallel and north of Haggerty Road, is completed through Pontiac Trail, Commerce Township officials anticipate a traffic jam at the intersection of Pontiac Trail and Haggerty, Currently they are working on the design phase of a six-year project to widen Haggerty Road to a five-land between Richardson and 14 Mile to adordevand between Richardson and 14 Mile to adordevand between Richardson and 14 Mile to adordevand heaters that traffic flow. The \$22 million plan, funded through the sale of bonds and Dewntown Development Authority funds, will include relocated Haggerty northwestorly through the Detroit Gun Club property and the old Commerce drive-in theater between Oakley Park and Richardson roads. 
