Benefiting from a favorable 4.31

percent interest rate, the library successfully sold more than \$12 million worth of bonds.

"So we now have money in the bank," Plummer said. "We're getting ready to spend it."

Last week, Papai and Plummer presented the Formington Hills City Council with a check for nearly \$560,000, to buy property needed for expansion of the Hills branch of the library on 12 Mile Road.

Plummer said it will be early 2001 before that expansion is completed. "And then we have the matter of making removations" to the existing facility.

"We do have a goal of completing all of this with very little, if any, disruption to the operation," he said. "We'll certainly have some closing time at both branches. But we'll keep that down to weeks, not months."
