# Lathrup avenges loss to Brother Rice

Mike Avery spent most of Thursday evening watching basketball on television. But it wasn't the NCAA tournament. It was a tape of last year's disappointing loss to Birmingham Brother Rice in the district championship game.

The Southfield-Lathrup conch was determined not to have a repeat when the Warriors defeated the Chargers in a Class A district final. The homework definitely paid off.

Lathrup rolled to its fourth district title in the last six years—but first under Avery—with a 67-41 triumph over Brother Rice Friday at Lathrup High School.

The Chargers (20-3) advance to the regional tournament hosted by Birmingham Groves and will play a first-round gamo 7:45 p.m. Tuesday against North Farmington (18-4).

Friday's triumph also capped a perfect home season in which the Chargers did not lose on their home court.

"We felt pretty confident; we did our homework on Brother Rice," said Avery, whose only other district championship was a few years ago while he was the Ann Arbor Huron girls coach.

"Our guys were very hungry, because this same Brother Rice team upset us last year. The focus was on my five seniors. I told them to bring us a championship home, and they did.

They stuck to our game plan; the intensity was at the highest level, he said. "It burt us last year to sit down and watch another team in our gym collect the trophy. We were undefeated all season at home, and it was a good way for my seniors to go out by winning the championship in their last home game."

That last home game turned into a surprisingly lopsided affair.

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Rice entered the district final on a three-game winning streak, and the young Warriors seemed to come of age in the recent Catholic Lengue championship, finishing as the runner-up to Orchard Lako St. Mary's.

But Lathrup's superior athleticism and senior expertise were too much for Rice to overcome. The Warriors couldn't stop the Chargers from slashing through the paint for easy baskets and were confounded by Lathrup's hounding man-to-man defense.

"They just outplayed us. They're a senior team, and they're stronger and quicker and more combative, said Rice coach. Bill Norton, who started four underclassmen. They just took our offense away. It was like they had us very well scouted.

Rice (10-13) managed to stay with Lathrup through the first quarter and half of the second.

Edwards gave his team a 19-14 lead when he ended the first quarter with a thunderous enshanded slam dunk.

The Chargers started the second with an 8-2 blitz for a 27-16 lead, but the Warriers charged right back with 10 straight points that included a pair of long-distance treys by junior guard Kylo Lawrenco.

The Chargers scored 11 of the next 14 points to take a 38-29 halftime lead. Lathrup continued that dominance by outscoring Rice 12-2 in the third quarter to complete a 23-5 onslaught over an 11-minute span that put the game out of reach.
