

Ault's pitching carries Hawks to division win

Senior Ali Ault pitched another one-hitter Monday as Farmington Harrison began division play with a 1-0 victory over visiting Livonia Franklin in softball.

Ault, who struck out six and walked none, had a no-hitter going until Franklin's Jeanette Bertrand hit a one-out single to right-center field in the seventh. Bertrand was the only baserunner the Patriots had. Ault had retired 33 consecutive batters to that point, including the last 14 of the previous game. Harrison had four hits off Franklin's Tara Muchow, who walked four, hit one batter and struck out five.

The Hawks scored their run in the fifth on Lindsey Emmett's sacrifice fly, scoring Sarah Tobie, who had walked and advanced on a walk to Lindsey Martinik and Ault's single through the middle.

Ault helped her cause with a pair of hits. Jenelle Welling and Kelly Taylor had the other Harrison hits.

"It was classic softball; it really was a pitcher's duel," Harrison coach Mike Teachman said. "Ault's pitching is allowing the young players to see the way the game should be played."

The Hawks played errorless softball, he added. Senior Britany Maxey fielded all nine chances at second base flawlessly.

"Ali throws the pitches and we still have to catch them," Teachman said.

Harrison is 2-0 overall and 1-0 in the Western Division of the Western Lakes Activities Association. Franklin is 2-1 and 0-1.

The only run she surrendered was in the top half of the fifth. Melanie Stein singled and worked her way to third, scoring on a fielder's choice.

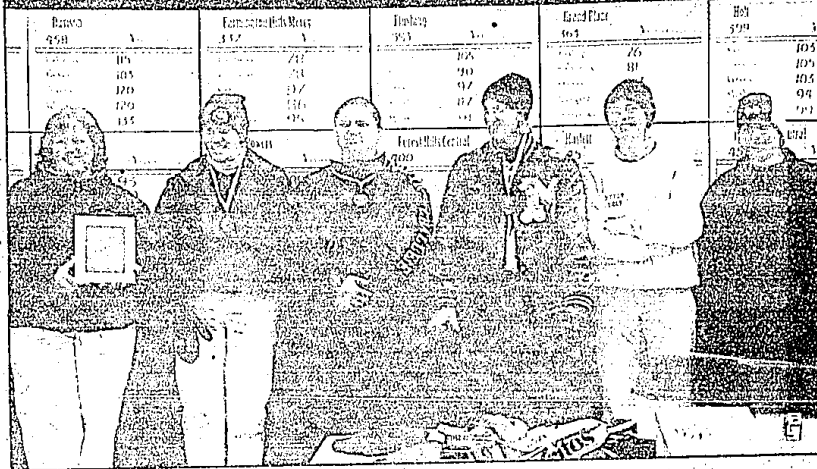

Harrison rallies in 2nd half for 2nd win

Farmington Harrison rallied from a 2-0 halftime deficit Monday to beat visiting Walley Lake Western in girls soccer, 4-2.

It was the second straight win for the Hawks, who improved to 2-2 overall and 1-2 in the Western Lakes Activities Association.

Harrison made some defensive adjustments at halftime, shut down the Western offense and scored four goals in the first 18 minutes of the second half.

Three of the four goals resulted from restarts — corner kick, direct kick and penalty kick. It was the first time a Harrison team has ever done that.

"The second-half adjustment of

Okeana Petrova put the Hawks ahead at the 17-minute mark, following a restart from

Jackson, who scored her second goal of the game a minute later on a penalty kick.

In the first half, Western's Angel Bushor scored just three minutes into the game, and Casey Hoover gave the Warriors a two-goal lead in the 28th minute.

"Western played well in the first half, winning most of the balls in the midfield area," Brouhan said. "Western was very fast with the ball on the outside of the field, scoring twice."
