PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the Farmington Hills City Council will give formal consideration to a proposed text amendment of the Farmington Hills City Code, Chapter 34, Zoning Chapter, which amendment will amend Section 34-67 and Section 34-63B. A summary of said amendment is as follows:
1. A proposal to amend the Farmington Hills City Code, Chapter 34, Zoning Chapter, which amendment will amend Article III, Section 34-57, RA-1A, RA-1B, RA-1C, RA-2, RA-3, and RA-4 One-Family Residential Districts, relating to subdivision open space plans, in order to clarify the standards for approval, to reduce the number of dwelling units permitted per acre, and to delete certain restrictions regarding lot depth and required rear yards.
2. A proposal to amend the Farmington Hills City Code, Chapter 34, Zoning Chapter, which amendment will amend Article XXVII, Section 34-63B, General Provisions, relating to nonconformities, in order to exempt subdivision open space plans or plans that were established at the number of dwelling units per acre permitted prior to the proposed amendment to Section 34-67 (b) (1) identified above.

UPDATE ON OSTEOARTHRITIS OF THE HANDS
In this previous column I discussed osteoarthritis of the hands. The first column emphasized the look of that type of arthritis. The knuckles are enlarged by the hands in their mobility. The second column pointed out that the changes are benign, as a result medicine was of little use in preventing the arthritis.
This column will talk about the pain associated with osteoarthritis. You may have heard that in osteoarthritis the hands look bad, but don't hurt. That statement is not completely accurate. Underlying the swelling that occurs in the knuckles and joints is the development of small bony enlargements at their point of contact. During their growing state, this extra bone can cause pain, but once that growth is finished, the pain ends.
If you are unlucky, that process occurs in starts and fits. Instead of having a short period of discomfort in the affected joint, you may experience pain in your hands that stops suddenly, and then from no apparent cause or event returns.
If your doctor sees you during a period of on-again, off-again pain, he is unlikely to make a definitive diagnosis. Blood tests do not help, and x-rays can only confirm you have not suffered an unexpected fracture or dislocation.
The medical response is to treat your pain. Presently, there is no evidence that any medication is better than acetaminophen, which is usually your doctor's choice. In time, the irritation set up by the osteoarthritis resolves and you need no treatment.

Parents of newborns may wonder when they should bring their children for their first visit to the dentist. The American Dental Association recommends that the first visit occur between the ages of six and twelve months, during which time the child's primary (baby) teeth are erupting. At this age, the dentist is able to observe the child's pattern of dental eruption and educate the parents about the developmental changes that are likely to occur. Parents can also gain valuable knowledge about helping their children maintain proper oral hygiene, nutrition, and fluoride use. From the child's standpoint, the initial visit to the dentist can be a positive experience that can lay a good foundation for oral health.
