## International Academy takes kids to scene of crime to learn

Farmington Hills police officer Brian Bastianelli brings everything but the yellow crime scene tape. Nonetheless, kids are still wrapped up in his class-

For three years, Bastianelli has given ninth grade biology students at the Bloomfield Hills-based International Academy an insight into forensiz science and how it is used at crime scenes. The public academy formed in 1996 specializing in international study and attracts 475

students countywide, including 30 from the Farmington area. Kids, who can put their recently acquired scientific knowledge to real life situations, are transfixed by it all. Some have expressed an interest going into forensic science as a result of the officer's presentations.

"They love it," Bastianelli said.
Bastianelli is an evidence technician and has been with the Hills
department for three years. He
was named the department's 1997
VFW Police Officer of the Year.
He started visiting the classroom at the behest of wife, Audra,
who is a biology teacher at the
candemy. They have been married
for seven years.
Audra thought her husband's
day-to-day work would be compelling fodder for students, who
are grappling with scientific methods and equations for the first
time.

The patrol officer manages to tie genetics, DNA and other sciences into evidence gathering — such as finger and footprints and ballistics of crime scenes.

Bastianelli even pulls out a fluorescent light around a bathroom sink to show how police find what otherwise might be hidden evidence.

"A lot of them say, 'Oh that's gross,' Bastianelli said. Students are not too aghast to follow up with at least a dozen 'who dunnit' questions.

Audra builds up to Brian's annun presentations with a series of lab activities on genetics and other related topics.

"At first the kids really didn't know how that could be used in the real world," said Audra, who taught in Berkley schools before joining the academy when it started three years age. "As it goes on, the presentations have evolved into this thing where kids look forward to it and where other stu-dents even come by to just say, 'hi."

International Academy principal Bert International Academy principal Bert Okma said students see a practical application of what they learn in the clasaroom. The principal sees another highlight. "He (Bastianelli) also presents a posi-tive image of law enforcement," Okma said.


