Vote Monday

A recap of our endorsements

Depending where you live in Farmington and Farmington Hills, you will cast votes Monday in races in the Farmington, Clarenceville, or Walled Lake school districts.

Here is a recap of our endorsements:

In the Farmington school election, voters should choose two incumbents, Linda Enberg and Gary Sharp. Both deserve re-election to the Farmington Board of Education.

Both are years apart in experience and tenure on the board. Enberg is seeking re-election to a second four-year term. Sharp is seeking election to a one-year term, the remaining time in a term left open when Joe Svoke resigned in August 1998.

We must give credit to Enberg who though running unopposed has made the campaign an opportunity to get out and talk with voters.

In the Clarenceville race, we recommend that you cast ballots for incumbents Matthew Boettcher and Ronald Silye. Each brings something different to the table when it comes to school board issues and each is seeking a second term.

Siegler is currently the board's secretary. Peterman is a lawyer specializing in juvenile law and child advocacy. She's also a mother of two elementary school students and an avid volunteer. She is chairwoman of an educational advisory committee set up by state Rep. Marc Shulman (R-West Bloomfield).


