Champion Cobras

NFWB 14-year-olds achieve World Series victory



Former Detroit Tigers pitcher Dan Petry relived one World Series memory Sunday and made another one that afternoon as coach of the 14-year-old NFWB Cobras, who won the USSSA World Series championship.

Sunday was a day filled with World Series memories — past and present — for former Major League pitcher Dan Petry

for former Major 2019——Petry.
As a member of the 1984 Detroit
Tigers championship team, he and his
teammates were honored at Tiger Stadium in commemoration of the 15th
anniversary of their World Series tri

umph.

Later that afternoon, Petry helped coach the 14-year-old North Farmington-West Bloomfield Cobras to the United States Specialty Sports Associa-

tion's AAA World Series title at Liberty Park in Sterling Heights.

"It was very coincidental, that we remember 1984 and at the same time have an opportunity to win one as youth baseball team," Petry 'said. There was too much deja vu. We felt like luck was on our side.

"We were in the driver's scat, too, C'ho St. Louis, Mo; Warriors) had to beat us twice, and we were really lead-ed with pitching that day; so we were in really good shape."

Setting a goal and achieving it is the major link between the 1984 Tigors and the 1999 Cobras, according to Petry.

"In '83 we had a goal and that was to

win the World Series, and we had been together as a toam for a number of years," he said. "We just foll a little short to Ballimore, which went on to win the World Series in 83. "I draw the analogy that we set a goal and we ended up achieving it. Not automatically; we ind a lat of work to do, but we achieved that goal. That's the way life works, setting goals and achieving them."

To prepare for national competition, the Cobras (46-3) have gone out of state to play the best teams they can schedule, including a trip to Atlanta in May to face teams from nationally-renowned East Cobb County.

"We've always challenged these kids," Petry said. "We went to a lot or really good World Series. We battled real hard and fell a little short but were proud of what we did.

"But we decided to take a look at this World Series even though we might be stepping down from the Majors (to

AAA). It was local and it made sense to do it.

We set that goal for them way back in the fall. We told them what our idna was; they were all for it, and they acomplished it.

In the championship game, the Cobras trailed the Warriors 8-7 after five innings but scored three runs in the bottom of the sixth and won, 10-8.

Danny Graham homered and Daug Pickens, who was 3-for-4 with three RBI, had a clutch single in the sixth Matt Clark tripled to knock in two runs, and Kevin Zerbe crushed a home run.


