Fire investigation continues

A fire that caused \$50,000 to the building and contents of a Farmington pizzeria early Mon-day morning is still being inves-tigated as suspicious, according to the Farmington Department of Public Safety.

Two victims, a 24-year-old
Dearborn man and a 24-year-old
Ypsilanti man, received skin
grafts at the University of Michigan Hospital last week and officers were still waiting to interview them, according to Mike

Wiggins, deputy director. Because of the suspicious nature of the fire, the victims' names have not been released.

Both are employees of Antonio's Pizza, 20772 Farmington Road, near Eight Mile. The fire reportedly started in the cooking area at about 12:22 a.m.

Wiggins said he was hopeful the skin graft procedures the men received mean the men will be well enough to be interviewed soon. They were listed in critical condition as of Friday afternoon.

They reportedly suffered

burns to their hands and faces. One victim was transported to Botsford Hospital in Farmington Hills, the other to St. Mary Hos-pital in Livonia. Both were later airlifted to the University of Michigan Hospital in Ann Arbor.


