Election workers get pay raise

On election day, a precinct worker shows up at 6:15 a.m. add, depending on whether peo-ple are voting for president or city council, doesn't call it quits until 10 p.m. Pay for 14-plus hours work had been \$50 a day for inspec-tors and \$50 for precinct chairs. That rate paled in comparison to other cities. In Novi, election workers get \$1,26 an hour while those in Llyonia receive a flat rate of \$55.

At the request of City Clerk Kathy Dornan, the Farmington Hills City Council unanimously voted to raise the sum to \$100 Voted to raise the sum to \$100 for preciment workers and \$120 for chairs at Monday's meeting. Farmington Hills has a ros-ter of 350 election workers, most of whom are seniors. Anywhere from 150-300 work at the city's 27 precincts on

election night. The pool of those willing to The pool of those willing to give up an entire day in August or November is dwin-dling, Dornan said. Reasons: Many cite the time involved and some seniors move to warmer arcens before Novem-ber elections. Then there are those like Marie Cole, who has been a precinet chair for more than 20 years. She works in Precinet No. 2 at North Farm-ington High.
