

The only thing missing was a victory.
Novi quarterback Mitch Maier saw to
that, rushing for 156 yards and the
winning touchdown as the Wildents
spoiled Farmington's much-anticipated

season opener — the first ever played under lights, 20-17.

The Falcons, ranked 10th best in the state in the preseason, had trouble stopping Novie option attack, especially the quarterback draw by Maier.

On 15 carries, he had most of his team's 258-yard rushing total, and he completed five of 11 passes for another 39 yards.

"That's one of the best offensive featball teams in Oakland County," Farm-

ington coach John Bechtel said, adding the Wildcats created seams for the option with their wide splits and for-
