City officials act to make sure nobody hogs the fun at Kids World

Now that Kids World PlayScape officially is up and available for use, Farmington city officials want to make sure the facility isn't monopolized by

the facility isn't monopolized by anyone.

During Tuesday's council meeting, a list of rules was approved. Also the council estab-lished rates for those wishing to reserve the Kids World pavilion, limiting reservations to two-hour blocks per day for groups and individuals.

individuals.

The cost to reserve the pavilion is \$15 per hour for residents of Farmington and Farmington Hills or \$20 per hour for non-residents, up to two hours per reservation. Farmington-Farmington Hills non-profit groups are exempted.

Those interested in reserving the pavilion must do so at city hall, 23600 Liberty Street.

Farmington City Manager
Frank Lauhoff said the hourly
rate to use the pavilion will help
offset the actual cost of maintemance and cleanup of that area.
Rules and regulations mirror
those for the other picnic pavilion in the east end of 8thvasasee Park, said Mardy Stirling, chair of the Farmington
Planning Commission and an
active member of the playscape
development committee.
"There are two sets of rules,
one for the pavilion and one for
(Kids World)," Stirling said.
Both of those are meant to help
make it a good place for everyone to visit."
And many people have been
visiting the playscape since the
Aug. 26 dedication ceremony.
"From what I understand, it's

been a packed house every day,"
Stirling added. "Everyone's
enjoying" the playscape. "It's a
real good addition to the city of
Farmington."
The Kids World committee
and city officials concurred that
pavilion visits be regulated in
terms of length.
In his recommendation to
council, Lauhoff said, "Since this
area is not designed for longterm picnics and large groups,
the shorter reservation time
should be adequate. At the same the shorter reservation time should be adequate. At the same time it will assure that the pavilion isn't monopolized .. by select groups or individuals."

Lauhoff, during an interview last week, emphasized that the playscape, itself, would remain open to everyone during periods when the pavilion is reserved.

Conversely, when the paviliant's booked, it is open for all playscape users, Lauhoff said.

Permit needed to catch critters

While seemingly humane, such dumping upsets the natural balance, Farmington Hills naturalist Joe Derek said.
Actually, the animal may get killed by another or starve, Derek said. "There's not enough food in one location," Derek said. "There is a volume of what food ander is available. All these animals can't live happily ever after there, (but) that's what people think."
For instance, woodchucks are

Live traps are not always the
answer when dealing with a
ravenous raccoon or smelly
skunk, a naturalist says.
Residents using such contraptions to rid animals from their
property creates other problems.
For one, the Department of
Natural Resources require problems.
For one, the Department of
Natural Resources require partial
nuisance permits to use five
traps, which are sold at hardware and sporting good stores.
Such traps, which also ensunare
household pets – can only beused within 460 feet of the
house.
Once they catch vermin DNR
mandates they be released
immediately or destroyed.
The law is very clear on it,
said 5gt. Tom Lennes, DNR conservation officer. They are not
allowed to transport them to
other areas.
"That's definitely a no-no.
They're spreading their problems
of the nearest wooded area.

In general, "unless it's around their house, live traps are not acceptable," said Lennox. Use of live traps without a permit could result in fines ranging 886-\$200, depending on the jurisdiction, Lennox said. Part of the solution is residents learning to live with nature.

dents learning to live with nature.
Some residents phone Derek to seek remedies for birds flying overhead to skunks traipsing across their lawns.
"You've just got to learn to live with them," Derek said. When I was a kid, we never thought about moving a squirrel. I get calls all the time. If they're eating out of your garden, put up a fence or plant different types of flowers.

fence or plant different types of flowers.

"(People) want to live in a navural area, but they don't want to telerate nature when it bothers them."

DNR's Lennox agrees.

"We do notice as the area grows, there is more and more conflict between humans and animals," Lennox said. "Usually the humans win out."
