Time to tune up the snow-blower is now

So your snowblower took a heavy hit last winter. Whose didn't? Here are a few things to help revive it.

Check the belts. Worn or old belts will slip in the pulleys when under a heavy load of snow. If your belt has a spring loaded idler as in the Toro 6520, make sure the spring has enough tension to keep the belt from slipping.

Keep paddles new

Check for worn down paddles. To ensure good throwing ability keep your paddles new. As paddles wear down and get shorter, their ability to slip or throw the snow decreases. So start with a fresh set of paddles and throw your snow in the neighbor's yard.

Get to the heart of your machine. Most light duty single stage snowblowers have two cycle engines in them and pound for pound they do a great job of moving snow. But a little help from you will make their job easier.

In the area of engine oil not all two-cycle oils are created equal. Only use oils that carry the BIA or TCW markings on the can or bottle. This will ensure your engine a good

lubrication and less friction. Check your spark plugs. The spark plug in a two-cycle engine is critical. If the plug is too hot it will damage the piston and burn a hole in it. If the plug is too cold it will rob your engine of its full power or foul out very easily.

In my last article we touched on fuel; how long to store it and the effect old fuel has on a motor. The same is true in two-cycle engines and even more so because of the oil that is mixed with the fuel. As the gas evaporates out of the can, the oil doesn't. So you end up with a greater concentration of oil than you should. And with the added age of the fuel, it's nothing but trouble. There is also a difference between summer gas and winter gas. So wait until the fall to buy your gas so that the winter additives are in it. This will help your unit start even easier.

Drain old gas

If you put your snowblower away last spring with gas left in it, by all means, get that fuel out and run it dry. The reason being, your snowblower will start in warmer temperatures with the old fuel in it. But it may not start in the colder weather.
