Store owned by Hills man robbed

A Canton Township man allegedly tried rebbing a party store Thursday afternoon in Red-ford Township but was chased away by a clerk. He the allegedly robbed a nearby flower shop before being arrested by local police.

The suspect, 31, was in custody in the township jail pending approval of charges by the Wayne Gounty Prosecutor's office, Redford police Inspector Denald Mehall said.

There were no injuries in either incident, he said.

The man initially went into the Frested Mug party store, 28802 Seven Mile east of Inkster Road, implying he had a weapon and demanding money, Mehall said. The clerk, a 39-year-old Southfield man, grabbed a miniature hockey stick and chased the suspect out of the store, Mehall said.

The employee does not speak English and called the store owner to report the incident, Mehall said. Before the police were called, the bandit walked into the Floral Cents flower shop, 27349 Seven Mile at Inkster Road, less than a quarter of a mile from the Frosted

Mug, Mehall said.

The shop owner called police to report the robbery, providing a description of the man and his sun, Mehall said. A Redford officer spotted a blue minivan at Seven Mile and Grand River, less than two miles from the Gover shop, Mehall said.

The driver matched the description of the suspect and the officer stopped him within a short distance on Grand River, west of Telegraph, Mehall said. The officer saw a large amount of money on the floor near the drivor's feet and arrested but no weapon was found, he said.



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
