If you thought Farmington Hills Mercy couldn't top its performance last year in the Oakland County girls swimming and diving meet, you were

And, if any of the other schools thought they might even challenge the Marlins, they were wrong, too. They simply had no chance.

But the Marlins were so right Saturday, scoring nearly a hundred points more than they did a year ago to win their third consecutive championship.

Mercy's team total was on impressive 3137, boints, almost double that of runner-up Bloomfield Hills Labser, which finished with 1632. The war will be second-place Knights 1633.

The top 10 this year included Birmingham Marian (165%), Birmingham Seaholm (132%), Novi (100), Bloomfield Hills Kingswood (94), Rochester (69), Birmingham Country Day (60), Rochester Adams (69) and North Farmington (61).

"We had 31 kids going in there," Mercy conch Jim Downs said, adding the didn't recall any team ever qualifying that many girls for the meet.
