

North falls to Salem after beating Bears

North Farmington was dealt a 2-0 loss by Plymouth Salem in boys soccer Monday, but the Raiders were not disappointed with their performance, according to coach Ron Meteyer.

"It was a good, good game," he said. "We felt like we gained some respect from the Salem players."

"When you look at what Salem has done to some other teams, we didn't feel too bad about losing 2-0."

The Rocks scored both goals in the first half. Jeff Haar scored the first on a rebound off the crossbar.

Scott Duhl split two defenders and fired a shot inside the box to make it 2-0 late in the first half.

Meteyer had praise for North sophomore goalie Mike Buchwald, who stopped 18 shots.

"He really stepped up his game," Meteyer said. "He was just on fire in there. We came at them in the second half. We figured we had nothing to lose."

The Raiders, who are 3-4-1 in the Western Lakes Activities Association and 6-5-1 overall, won a non-league game Saturday over visiting Barkley, 4-1.

Brian Horr gave North a one-goal lead, scoring from a difficult angle on the baseline. The Bears tied it with a rebound shot off
