By the 1920s forms were being developed into subdivisions, par-ticularly along Grand River, which was accessible from the roads and the DUR. The DUR was as close as Farmington ever out to rould transit. get to rapid transit.

In 1924, when Grand River was widened, Henry Ford bought the Botsford Inn to preserve it. He moved it back 200 feet and researched its origin. A number of Clarenceville houses along Grand River were moved to the new subdivisions.
