Pre-formed ponds have become very popular in recent years. The nice thing about them is that they can be placed virtually anywhere. Ive had a two hundred gallon pond in our yard for the last four years. If yours is in the ground you would not want to drain it.

The weight of the water in the pond is encessary to prevent the pond from heaving during the freezes and thaws of the winter. A full pond year-round should always remain level.

An empty pond, aubject to winter heaving, would probably have to be leveled each spring. Most ponds like yours are usually about eighteen inches deep so any fish would have to be brought inside for the winter.

you have one.
