WHAT COUNTY SOLONS DID AT THE RECENT SPECIAL MEETING

The board of supervisors last week defeated the good roads proposition by a vote of 16 to 12 and the question will not be submitted to the people at this time.

The board decided to employ county jail prisoners on the highways of the county and appointed a committee to perfect the plan to be carried out.

The local option petitions were acted upon and the question ordered submitted to the electors next spring.

The board voted to retain the matron at the rest room at a salary of \$4 a week and to pay the jail matron \$5 a week.

The supervisors voted \$50 to the County Pioneer society and also decided to hold another picnic next summer at Lake Orion.

Action on the proposition to place the sheriff on a salary was deferred until the October session as was also the matter of employing some one to correct the abstract books up to date.

J. J. Davis gave this office a short but pleasant call last week. Mr. Davis, who is one of the best posted men in the county on the political situation, predicts that Taft will get scant courtesy from the farmers of Oakland county.
